Until the Project Coordinator has been assigned, Titia Zoeter, from the Jewish Historical Museum in Amsterdam, will act as AEJM administrator. She is continuing the work of Ulrike Roth, who took care of the AEJM administration with great effort. We would like to thank Ulrike for her enthusiasm, initiative and dedication.

The website of the AEJM, www.aejm.org, was relaunched in autumn 2010. It was redesigned to meet our new needs. With the new website we aim to provide a more effective channel of communication to members, as well as to serve as a resource for the wider public. The website includes facilities such as newsletters, the dissemination of members' annual reports and opportunities to exchange information about travelling exhibitions, current developments and other projects. In the near future we would also like the AEJM website to create the means to help members communicate with each other on topics or projects of common interest. The AEJM would like to thank Head of the Media department at the Jewish Museum Berlin, Mirjam Wenzel, and her colleagues for their expertise and help in creating the style of the new site.

Curatorial Education Programme

The professional training and development of curatorial staff plays a key role within the AEJM's mission to assist members in meeting the challenges of today. The AEJM therefore offers an annual Curatorial Education Programme (CEP), to be held in different European Jewish Museums in cooperation with relevant academic institutions.

The training courses focus on vital aspects of curatorial work: the identification and documentation of Judaica, the development of conservation, research tools and skills, interpretation and educational aspects of Judaica.

The first CEP was held in March 2010 at the Jewish Museum of Vienna. Chief Curator, Dr. Felicitas Heimann-Jelinek organised the five-day programme. "It is designed to meet the particular needs of curatorial staff in Jewish Museums" says Heimann-Jelinek, former board member of the AEJM. The educational programme has been a long term goal of the AEJM since its founding in 1988. As evaluation and participant feedback have shown, the first CEP was clearly an overall success. Opportunities for further improvement have been taken in consideration in the planning of the second educational programme, which will be kindly hosted by the Jewish Museum Berlin, and will take place from April 11 to 15, 2011. World War I Workshop

On March 6-7, 2011 the Jewish Museum Munich organised an exhibition workshop on “World War I as an European, National and Jewish Experience”. In 2014 the 100 year anniversary of World War I will be commemorated. Jews all over Europe were affected by the first “modern war” in many ways. The workshop discussed possibilities for collaboration in a European-wide focus of exhibitions on World War I in 2014. The idea was discussed first in an extra session at the last AEJM meeting in Rome last fall and at the workshop interested museums gave presentations on perspectives and issues relevant in their own local contexts, as well as material they could draw on to illustrate the topic.

The workshop began to discuss possibilities for collaboration and a special session dealt with EU funding possibilities, although this indicated that potential EU sources seemed limited and quite specific in their requirements. It is planned to continue these discussions at a further workshop to be held following the Annual Conference in London, on the afternoon of November 22 and morning of November 23, 2011.

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
