10:00 – 11:30	The 22. July Center	The 22. July Centre is a learning centre that works with the mediation of memory and knowledge about the terror attacks in Oslo and on Utøya on the 22nd of July 2011. Its permanent exhibition <i>The Public Conversation About 22 July</i> contains a timeline of the terror attack that took place that day, as well as seven narratives about 22 July. The Centre offers various pedagogical programmes and closely works with eye-witnesses of the terror attacks. It receives many school groups from all over Norway. We will meet with educator Stine Furan , who will introduce the educational practice of the Centre.
11:30 – 13:00	Transfer & Lunch	Travels to Utøya by bus and ferry. Lunch will be served on the bus
13:00 – 16:45	Utøya	On 22 July 2011, the island of Utøya became the scene of a terrorist attack in when the summer camp of the youth organisation of Norway's Labour party was attacked by a far-right terrorist. Today, with a strong belief in that knowledge overcomes xenophobia, hate speech and conspiracy theories, Utøya strives to be an open, accessible and inclusive arena for engaging, learning and remembering. After a guided tour of the island, we will meet with Lars Gudmundson , Director of

the Learning Centre, for an exchange on the Centre's educational strategy and activities.

Before we head back to the main land by ferry, **Jolien Posthumus** will facilitate a Trauma Sensitive Mindfulness based recap of today's programme.

9:30 – 11:00	Intercultural Museum	The Intercultural Museum was founded in 1990 to promote understanding and respect for cultural diversity. It is located in a former police station in Oslo's most diverse district. The museum curates exhibitions about immigration history, culture and prejudices. Every year around 8000 pupils participate in their educational programmes. During our visit, we will do a workshop in the exhibition <i>Typical</i> , one of the museum's most popular exhibitions. Curator Gazi Özcan will give us an introduction to the exhibition and talk about the process of creating it. Educator Marte Marie Ofstad will be our workshop leader.
11:00 – 11:30	Transfer	We will walk back to the Oslo Jewish Museum
11:30 – 12:30	Lunch	Lunch will be served at the Oslo Jewish Museum
12:30 – 13:45	JMB on.tour	Since this September, the Jewish Museum Berlin is taking the new mobile exhibition <i>on.tour</i> all across Germany. With <i>on.tour</i> , JMB goes to schools that are not able to visit the museum in Berlin. The JMB outreach programmes first started bringing German-Jewish culture, history and contemporary life to teenagers and

young adults in 2007. In three study periods, the renewed outreach programme communicates themes and contents from the new permanent collection, which students can discuss and relate to their own lives. **Sarah Hiron**, Dept. Head of Education at JMB (DE) will elaborate on the development process, the focus groups involved, accessibility, and evaluation tools. We will also work with some *on.tour* workshop materials.

MANFRED LEVY



His first teaching job was at the Jewish School in Frankfurt, where he later assumed the position of principal. In 2000, Manfred started working at a comprehensive school in the city. After working there for 10 years the Minister of Education of Hessen delegated him to Jewish Museum Frankfurt in 2010. His main focus at the museum has been Judaism, Jewish daily life, Islam, anti-Semitism, islamophobia and intercultural learning. In addition to running educational programs, he was also in charge of training the guides and creating new programs for the different exhibitions. Manfred retired from the museum earlier this year and is still involved as a freelancer in a variety of pedagogical activities both at outside of and at the museum.
